10.10am **Lessons learned from breach response**
Ross McKean Partner and Co-chair of UK Cyber and Data Protection Practice, DLA Piper

Ross will present on lessons learned from breach response in the new world of GDPR, 18 months on. He will share thoughts on good and bad incident response practices through the lens of GDPR. What is emerging best practice for incident response under GDPR? What are the traps to avoid that might aggravate regulatory fines and sanctions and the growing threat of group litigation?

Kuan Hon Director, Privacy, Security and Information Law, Fieldfisher

As a Director with Fieldfisher's Privacy, Security & Information Law team, Kuan focusses on data protection, privacy, security and information law, working mainly with large multinationals. She will present a cross-EU roundup of security-related enforcement action by regulators under GDPR to date, illustrate what have been the key failings and issues that have garnered fines, and discuss ways for organisations to reduce their risks.

11:45pm **Beyond Discovery: Automating Data Privacy for GDPR**
Matt Lock Technical Director (UK), Varonis Systems

The ICO urged organisations to build a digital asset register of all Personally Identifiable Information (PII) held, and then create policies around how to manage it. Nearly two years on, we've learnt many lessons from the field. To stand any chance of staying on top of this regulation, then automation needs to play a big part, whether it be deletion, re-certification of access or responding to a breach. In this session Matt will discuss:

- Who has the ICO been fining and what can we learn from these cases?
- How do we automate critical aspects of our data privacy programmes?
- How may we leverage the incident response to meet the breach notification requirement?
- How do we make our data security policies "GDPR-aware" and successful?

12.15pm **Security vs Privacy - some thoughts and reflections**

Following Craig's recent switch from security to privacy he will describe some of the differences he perceives between these disciplines, the overlaps between them and how best they may work together. He will also debunk some common GDPR myths (right to be forgotten, consent requirements, data transfers, etc.)

1.30pm **GDPR and global privacy laws**
Steve Wright CEO & Partner, Privacy Culture Limited

GDPR is having a profound effect on data governance, organisations, economies, governments and regulators around the world. The scope of GDPR is so wide, so encompassing, that its principles of 'accountability' are now embedded across 120 different in-country laws, including the new SMCR regime that impacts 50,000 organisation in the financial sector. Even the mighty economy of the USA now has thirteen states drafting new data privacy laws based on GDPR. So, it is here to stay, so what should we concentrate on, given the expanding requirements of data protection law around the world?

After 35 years of Data Protection, GDPR changed how companies comply with the regulation. The scale of potential penalties and the scope of the rules around marketing, cookies and privacy notices show how companies will have to keep compliance and auditing firmly on their radar. Paul and Brian will look at how your business divisions and compliance team will need to steer your organisation through ever-tightening rules.

FireEye's DPO Richard Weaver will describe as case study FireEye's approach to GDPR compliance and discuss the various aspects that FireEye advises their customers to consider in understanding what data has been affected in a data breach.
