The leading cause of breaches remains identity-based attacks, with four out of five involving identity-based techniques. Whilst these types of attacks have been recorded as a key cyber risk for many years, the shift away from traditional networking to cloud-native and SaaS applications has increased both the likelihood and impact of identity-based attacks. Many of these techniques have been historically labelled 'unsophisticated', but recent high-profile breaches demonstrate how these techniques remain as effective as ever, and how attackers are moving away from conventional methods to target identity infrastructure. It's vital that organisations recognise these shifts to be able to detect and respond effectively.
